






<u>Alabama Science Assessment (ASA)</u> - The following chart shows the change in percent of students scoring proficient on the Alabama Science Assessment from 2009 to 2010. Fifth and seventh graders take this assessment annually.



<u>Alabama Direct Assessment of Writing (ADAW)</u> - The following chart shows the change in percent of fifth, seventh, and tenth graders scoring proficient on the ADAW from 2009 to 2010. Spring, 2010, marked the last time the state will administer this assessment.




**Stanford Achievement Test (SAT10)** In 2010 Alabama shifted to requiring and reporting only reading and math results on the SAT10. Spring, 2010, was the next-to-last time the state will administer this assessment. JCS performance on the *Stanford* 10 Achievement Test in 2010 placed Jasper City Schools in the top 12% of the school systems in the state. Students in grades 3 – 8 scored 64.16 on reading and 66 on math.




<u>Alabama Reading and Math Test (ARMT)</u> - On the Alabama Reading and Math Test (ARMT), JCS students exceeded all 2010 state benchmarks. In the following chart, the top portion of each bar shows the percentage of JCS students scoring proficient in ARMT reading, while the lower portion of each bar indicates the 2010 state benchmark in reading for each grade.

#### **ARMT READING**




#### **ARMT MATH**



Alabama High School Graduation Examination (AHSGE) - The percentage of twelfth graders passing each section of the Alabama High School Graduation Exam (AHSGE) is shown in the following chart. The AHSGE includes five subject-area tests students must pass to receive a high school diploma. The exam covers required high school core content. Once a student passes a subject-area test, the student does not have to repeat that test. No later than the spring of tenth grade, students have an opportunity to attempt all five tests.



<u>American College Test (ACT)</u> - ACT scores of 2010 Walker High students continued to exceed state and national averages. WHS students scored a composite of 21.2, while the state composite was 20.3, and the national composite was 21.0.



The ACT is a college entrance exam made up of four curriculum-based assessments in English, math, reading, and science. ACT scores range from 1 to 36. ACT subject-area tests reveal students' skills and achievement levels as culminations of their high school experiences and function as important measures of student preparation for postsecondary academic work.

## JCS Educational Excellence Fund Drawing from Variety of Sources to Enhance Education in Jasper Schools

Through aggressive fundraising efforts, the Jasper City Schools Educational Excellence Fund has received over \$250,000, which includes grants from the Wachovia Foundation, the Daniel Foundation of Alabama, the Malone Family Foundation, the ALFA Foundation, and the Community Foundation of Greater Birmingham.

The Jasper City Schools Excellence in Education Fund is operated in partnership with the Walker Area Community Foundation, independently from the school system. In the first phase of a fundraising campaign in 2009, potential investors identified four key issues for future focus of the Educational Excellence Fund: 1. Enhance technology, math and science curriculum;

- 2. Ensure high school graduates are life and work ready; 3. Expand foreign language instruction;
- 4. Enhance performing arts/fine arts curriculum.

### In Jasper Schools, Learning is More than Academics

Academic learning is a priority in the Jasper schools, but many activities are focused on helping students become productive, civic-minded individuals who serve others and face life with a positive outlook. Numerous student groups conducted service activities that helped the Jasper and Walker County community during the 2009-2010 year. Students were also recognized for displaying positive attitudes during daily school activities.

"Do Your Part -Have a Heart" was the theme for the MMS National Junior Honor Society's February service project. Through combined efforts from 39 NJHS members, a total of 75 volunteer hours of community service was performed.



Club members assisted with activities such as planting trees around Town Creek, working at the Salvation Army Food Bank, distributing valentines at area nursing homes, selling shirts for Paralyzed Veterans of America, serving food at the Hope Kitchen, cleaning offices at the Adam Bishop Center, and assisting with horses at the Reins of Life Youth Ranch.



Amici, Jr. members from Maddox Middle School teamed with members of the Peacemakers Club at T.R. Simmons Elementary to prepare elder emergency kits--known as "E.E.K." kits—for senior citizens to use during minor emergencies. Students then distributed the kits to residents of The Terrace in Jasper.

Along with raising student achievement, helping students develop self-confidence, learn respect for others, and maintain a positive attitude are always goals for educators at West Jasper Elementary. STAR (Showing Terrific Attitudes Regularly) students were recognized throughout the 2009-2010 year.
